A Brief Report of Research

Care Activities for Deceased Patients of Intensive Care Nurses at a Private Hospital in Istanbul, Turkey

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The purpose of this study was to determine nursing care for deceased patients among intensive care unit nurses. This prospective, observational study was conducted in Istanbul, Turkey. The sample consisted of 20 intensive care nurses caring for 39 deceased patients during the study period. Researchers observed the care activities of the nurses and these were recorded. All the nurses closed the curtains or placed screens to separate the deceased patient from others and to allow some privacy for the family. Two nurses allowed the family to participate in the care. There was no difference in care activities according to the religious affiliation of the patients.

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INTRODUCTION

Patients who have cardiovascular and pulmonary problems; sustain trauma, sepsis, and multisystem organ failure; and have unstable hemodynamic parameters and/or other life-threatening conditions are admitted to intensive care units (ICUs). Unfortunately some of these patients die. ¹⁻³ The percentage of mortality (about 20%) in the ICU in Turkey is high despite advanced medicine and improved technology. Death is seen in the ICU quite frequently; it may be expected or unexpected by healthcare professionals. Nevertheless, the process may be viewed as difficult and backbreaking. ^{2,4-6}

In this situation, nurses have important responsibilities. After a patient's death, nurses fulfill these responsibilities by caring for the patient's body, providing emotional support to the family, preparing an environment to adapt to the family's cultural and religious beliefs, and following any legal procedures. 4,5,7-10

When reviewing the literature, little was found about this topic. Most articles focused on the care of the dying patient, not care provided after death.

PURPOSE

The purpose of this study was to determine nursing care activities for deceased patients in the ICU. The research questions were the following:

What does a nurse do to care for deceased patients in the ICU?

What are the factors that influence nursing care activities for the deceased patient?

Permission to conduct the research was obtained from the hospital's director of nursing services and each of the ICU nurses after informing them about the study. The ICU nurses gave both written and verbal consent.
